Support Student Achievement

- Consider spaces that support innovation, programming and personalized learning

Create Flexible Spaces for Current & Future Needs

- Consider existing building capacity, community growth and future enrollment
- Consider 21st Century learning and a focus on spaces that support personalized learning
- Consider amenities that recognize community use of public schools

Maintain Efficient Facilities

- Consider options that maximize existing buildings, systems and programs for energy conservation
- Consider new construction that leverages modern design, effective use of space and responsible use of resources

Reflect Community Values

- Options should reflect community priorities and input

Manage Taxpayer Dollars Responsibly

- Consider project costs and the tax impact on mill rate and overall tax levy
- Consider long-term solutions to address aging buildings, systems and projected growth for the next 15-20 years

Provide Equitable Facilities District-Wide

- Consider options that provide safe, accessible buildings with common amenities for technology infrastructure and appropriate learning spaces for all students

Utilize Data for Decision Making

- Consider multiple data points including surveys, housing unit and facility studies, enrollment projections and capacity studies
